SUBJECT: Draft Release and Preliminary Funding Model for the Utility Rate Study

PURPOSE OF WORKSHOP ITEM

The purpose of this update is to provide Council with the results of the preliminary water and wastewater utility fund financial plans including projected annual rate revenue adjustments possibly starting January 1, 2021 and provide Council with the results of the future water and wastewater capacity analysis which will inform the Town on upcoming capital improvement projects. *Staff is working on a pre-recorded powerpoint presentation to provide to Council. At the time of submission of this staff report, the powerpoint link was not ready. If the pre-recorded powerpoint presentation does not come to fruition, the powerpoint presentation will be presented during the workshop. If the presentation is ready and usable, staff will email Council a link to it. The powerpoint presentation will inform Council on the preliminary financial model discussed.*

DESIRED OUTCOME

The direction requested from Council includes:

1. Are the preliminary financial models an acceptable basis for continuing steps in the Rate Study?
2. Is the potential issuance of future debt service acceptable to fund two significant water fund capital projects?

BACKGROUND/ALTERNATIVES

In 2019, the Town issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) outlining the requirements of a Comprehensive Water and Wastewater Utility Rate and Capacity Fee Study (Rate Study) to be completed. As a result of the RFP processes, the Town selected Nelson Engineering and Raftelis to complete the study. The last externally led rate study was completed by Rick Giardina and Associates in 2000 with an update completed by the same firm in 2002.

Rate History

The Town's rates were last updated in 2014¹. The following is a brief history of the Town's water and wastewater systems rates:

- 1970: Built treatment plant
- 1970: Rates implemented ranging from \$3.57 (domestic) to \$37.25 for laundry. Outside town rates 2 times inside Town rates.
- 1980: 1st rate adjustment implemented increasing rates ranging from \$5.00 (domestic) to \$49.87 for laundry.
- 1986: Equivalent residential unit (ERU) and multiples of ERUs implemented with \$11.50 per ERU with one laundry machine considered an ERU as well.
- 1989: Tiered rates implemented. \$6.000 for the first 5,000 gallons per month and \$0.55 for each thousand gallons over 5,000 gallons per month per customer.
- 1992: 1st external rate study completed by Bob Norton and Town staff resulting in base fees being implemented.

¹ 3-Creek water and wastewater rates were updated annually in 2015 through 2019, but other customer rates have not been updated

- 1995: Irrigation adjustment factor included in volume rates for sewer billing.
- 1997: Eliminated outside Town rate multiplier.
- 2000 – 2002: 2nd external rate study completed by Bob North and Rick Giardina
 - Modernized rate structure
 - Base charges, capacity fees, and volume rates by schedule varying by customer type (when warranted) was implemented.
- 2004: Irrigation sewer adjustment implemented. Transitioned from reduction off summer quarter to winder averaging for sewer volume billing.
- 2005: 3-Creek added to system and unique service arrangement resulted in 3-Creek only rate structure.
- 2006 – 2010: Periodic updates to Town rates and annual 3-Creek rate updates completed.
- 2011 - 2014: Rates updated by Town staff with 3-year rate plan for 2012, 2013 and 2014 implemented.
- 2015 – Current: 3-Creek rates updated annually with no change to Town or other rates.

Raftelis initiated its study in October 2019 and completed project preliminary meetings with Town staff in November 2019. Since then, Raftelis has led meetings with Town staff and a Citizen Review Committee (CRC) established to receive input from stakeholders and community representatives regarding rates recommendations to be developed. Raftelis has led 4 of the 6 total CRC meetings they are contracted to hold.

The next major milestones include:

- Customer class cost-of-service analysis to be completed in May 2020.
- Capacity fee update and assessment schedule recommendations to be completed in May 2020.
- Rate structure alternatives modifying the water and wastewater rate structures completed in June 2020.
- Two remaining CRC meetings resulting in a CRC report to Town Council to be completed in June 2020.
- Public meeting or Town Council workshop anticipated for June or July 2020.
- Final study findings and recommendations presented to Town Council in August 2020.

Capacity History

This study is a first. Various analyses have occurred through the years including a 1992 Facilities Plan Study that addressed expansion to the Town's current wastewater treatment plant. Localized capacity studies have also been conducted for specific development projects or new service areas, but we have never evaluated the system as a whole to consider anticipated growth or the additions of non-Town entities into the larger system.

Nelson Engineering has performed an analysis of the Town of Jackson's water and sewer system and an asset analysis of the existing components and conditions. They physically inspected storage tanks, well houses, booster stations, valve vaults, the Wastewater Treatment Plant, and lift stations, which is all also a part of the current study. Existing water meter data was collected from Town staff and placed in the water and sewer geographic information system (GIS) so that existing water and sewer transmission and distribution facilities could be evaluated. Water and sewer models were evaluated to determine deficiencies. Working with Town staff, Nelson updated capital improvement plans for water and sewer and addressed potential improvements needed for both aging infrastructure and those assets lacking capacity.

STAKEHOLDER ANALYSIS

Stakeholder analysis for the item included the Finance Director, Town Engineer, Water and Sewer Division personnel, and the Citizen Review Committee (CRC). As part of the Rate Study process, the Town formed a volunteer Water and Wastewater Rates CRC made up of a group of volunteers with diverse interests representing water and wastewater customers/stakeholders. This group was formed to support the Town's belief that our community should have a voice in decisions that affect them. The CRC has worked together to provide input and community perspective specific from the user groups they represent. Our mission in forming the CRC is to ***assemble diverse perspectives that represent our community to evaluate and advise on the Town's water and wastewater rates and rate structure(s)***. The CRC has three overarching purposes:

- a. Provide views that are representative of respective stakeholder groups
- b. Provide input on rate structure options and associated customer impacts
- c. Formulate a recommendation to the Town Council

FISCAL IMPACT

Fiscal impact for the Rate and Capacity study was approved at the October 21, 2019 evening council meeting for \$391,561.00. Once the rate option is approved and revenue requirements are calculated, there may be a fiscal impact to the users of both the water and sewer systems. Raftelis will provide a sampling of a minimum of three customers per classification showing the difference of charges between the existing and proposed rates changes. Further, Raftelis will present each rate structure option under a phased implementation timeline scenario and calculate the associated rate change (in dollars) for each scenario. Both Raftelis and the Nelson Engineering team will consider and evaluate the following elements for inclusion in proposed rate structure options:

1. Consistency between rate schedules and fee schedules;
2. Consumption/revenue elasticity based on any proposed rate increases/decreases;
3. Adequate and equitable usage, demand, and basic charges;
4. Conservation costs and reimbursements;
5. Low income rates and charges with example criteria such as a senior and/or hardship rates;
6. Foreseeable future enhancements (sewer treatment plant and wells) and optional rates based on different funding strategies designed for estimated future capacity/growth; and
7. Accomplishment of short term goals and long-term stabilization.

STAFF IMPACT

Staff impact for this item will require the Town Engineer to spend an estimated ten hours a week managing the project team, deliverables and timeline. Additional staff time by both the Water and Wastewater Managers will be spent providing asset/flow information in their respective divisions. The Town Finance Director will also be affected in terms of time spent, estimated at 5 hours per week, producing detailed information on customer classes and our current rate structure. The Town Planning Department will need to provide support for both studies with regards to existing development and future growth projections, it is expected that this will be a couple of significant efforts but not regular hours throughout the project. The consultant will also be working with the County Planning Department on potential future growth beyond Town's limits.

LEGAL ISSUES

Though there are no legal issues for the purposes of this staff report, there will be legal time spent updating the Town ordinance governing rates.

Staff recommends:

1. Endorsement of the preliminary financial plans, including the issuance of any future debt service, as a basis for subsequent Rate Study steps for the Water Fund Financial Plan and Wastewater Fund Financial Plan.

SUBJECT: Vaping Ordinance

PURPOSE OF WORKSHOP ITEM

Direction was provided to staff by the Town Council at the February 18, 2020 Regular Meeting to look into vaping ordinances adopted by other Towns, possible options for Jackson, and to bring the issue back at a future workshop.

DESIRED OUTCOME

The desired outcome is to receive direction from the Town Council to bring forward an ordinance for consideration at the May 4 evening meeting related to this topic.

BACKGROUND/ALTERNATIVES

After this direction was provided, the Town Attorney researched the ordinance adopted by the Town of Pinedale, WY that prohibits the sale of flavored tobacco products. She also researched Cheyenne's ordinance but it simply related to use in public places and so did not appear to be as close to what the Council wanted. Teton County School District was contacted regarding the potential for this ban as well as Beverly Shore, the Community Prevention Specialist for Teton County Public Health, and both are in support of this type of action being taken. A rough draft of an ordinance modeled after Pinedale's ordinance is attached to this staff report.

The Council has many options available to them including:

1. Direct staff to update the draft ordinance based on discussions today and present it for first reading at the May 4 regular Town Council meeting.
2. Direct staff to prepare a resolution on this issue instead of an ordinance and present that at the next earliest opportunity.
3. Continue the discussion to a future workshop.
4. Other.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN ALIGNMENT

Prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products would support Principle 1.2 – Preserve and enhance water and air quality in that it would reduce the use of flavored tobacco products as they would not be available for sale in the Town of Jackson.

STAKEHOLDER ANALYSIS

The stakeholders involved with this type of action would include retailers that sell these products, consumers of these products, health care providers serving patients that develop health issues as a result of using these products, parents of youth that will be assured the products cannot be obtained within Town limits, educators responsible for teaching youth that have nicotine in their system as a result of using this product, public health officials invested in protecting and improving the overall health of the community, etc.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no direct fiscal impact of directing staff to prepare an ordinance for consideration at the May 4 Town Council meeting. The fiscal impact of banning this sale may result in a marginal decrease in sales and use taxes.

Ordinance passage has fiscal impacts associated with advertising. Upon passage of an ordinance, retailers would need to be educated about the change.

STAFF IMPACT

Providing direction to staff to prepare an ordinance will have a staff impact, some initial research has been conducted. Passage of the ordinance on third reading will require codification, education of the public, and enforcement by the Jackson Police Department.

LEGAL ISSUES

The Town Attorney will be researching legal issues associated with such a prohibition as well as finalizing any draft ordinance presented for Council consideration.

ATTACHMENTS

ORDINANCE xxx

AN ORDINANCE ADDING CHAPTER 8.35 TO THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE TOWN OF JACKSON PROHIBITING THE SALE OF FLAVORED TOBACCO PRODUCTS AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF JACKSON, WYOMING, IN REGULAR SESSION DULY ASSEMBLED THAT

SECTION I.

There is hereby added Chapter 8.35 of Title 8 Sale of Flavored Tobacco Products Prohibited of the Municipal Code of the Town of Jackson as follows:

CHAPTER 8.35 SALE OF FLAVORED TOBACCO PRODUCTS PROHIBITED

8.35.010 Legislative Findings

WHEREAS, the Town of Jackson, Wyoming ("Town") is a municipal corporation existing pursuant to the laws of the Wyoming Constitution, the Wyoming Statutes, and the Town Charter; and

WHEREAS, the Town has a responsibility to protect the health of its youth, citizens and guests; and

WHEREAS, the use of tobacco products by the children is a pediatric disease of considerable proportions that results in new generations of tobacco-dependent children and adults; and

WHEREAS, a consensus exists within the scientific and medical communities that tobacco products are inherently dangerous and cause cancer, heart disease, and other serious adverse health effects; and

WHEREAS, nicotine is an addictive drug; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council finds and determines that prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products would help address the health problems associated with such use by youth in the community, and would be in the best interest of the public health, safety, and welfare of the Town.

8.35.020 Purpose

This chapter is enacted to prohibit the sale of flavored tobacco products within the Town of Jackson.

8.35.030 Definitions

As used in this Chapter the following definitions apply:

- A. **Cigarette** means any product that contains nicotine, is intended to be burned or heated under ordinary conditions of use, and consists of or contains: (1) any roll of tobacco wrapped in paper or in any substance not containing tobacco; (2) tobacco, in any form, that is functional in the product, which, because of its appearance, the type of tobacco used in the filler, or its packaging and labeling, is likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as a cigarette; or (3) any roll of tobacco wrapped in any substance containing tobacco which, because of its appearance, the type of tobacco used in the filler,

or its packaging and labeling, is likely to be offered to or purchased by, consumers as a cigarette described in clause (1) of this definition.

- B. **Characterizing Flavor** means a distinguishable taste or aroma, other than the taste or aroma of tobacco or menthol, imparted either prior to or, during consumption of a tobacco product or component part thereof, including, but not limited to, tastes or aromas relating to any fruit, chocolate, vanilla, honey, candy, cocoa, dessert, alcoholic beverage, herb or spice and concepts such as spicy, arctic, ice, cool, warm, hot, mellow, fresh, and breeze; provided, however, that no tobacco product shall be determined to have a characterizing flavor solely because of the use of additives or flavorings or the provision of ingredient information.
- C. **Component Part** means any element of a Tobacco Product, including, but not limited to, the tobacco, filter and paper, but not including any Constituent.
- D. **Constituent** means any ingredient, substance, chemical or compound, other than tobacco, water or reconstituted tobacco sheet, that is added by the manufacturer to a Tobacco Product during the processing, manufacture or packing of the Tobacco Product. Such term shall include a smoke constituent.
- E. **Flavored Tobacco Product** means any Tobacco Product, or any Component Part thereof, that contains a Constituent that imparts a Characterizing Flavor. A public statement or claim made or disseminated by the manufacturer of a Tobacco Product or by any person authorized or permitted by the manufacturer to make or disseminate public statements concerning such Tobacco Product, that such Tobacco Product has or produces a Characterizing Flavor shall constitute presumptive evidence that the Tobacco Product is a Flavored Tobacco Product.
- F. **Smoke Constituent** means any chemical or chemical compound in main-stream or side-stream tobacco smoke that either transfers from any component of the tobacco product to the smoke or that is formed by the combustion or heating of tobacco, additives or other component of the tobacco product.
- G. **Tobacco Product** means any product containing tobacco or nicotine, be it natural, synthetic or derived from plant based inputs and regardless of the method of derivation, including but not limited to cigars, pipe tobacco, snuff, chewing tobacco, dipping tobacco, bidis, snus, dissolvable tobacco products, and electronic cigarette cartridges; provided, however, that such term shall not include: (1) cigarettes, including those cigarettes subject to the Special Rule for Cigarettes relating to characterizing flavors of the federal Family Smoking and Tobacco Prevention Act and (2) any product that has been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration pursuant to its authority over drugs.

8.35.040 Sale of Flavored Tobacco Products Prohibited

It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any Flavored Tobacco Product to a person.

SECTION II

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION III

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be

deemed as a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance.

SECTION IV

This Ordinance shall become effective after its passage, approval, and publication.

RE: Ordinance Prohibiting the Sale of All Flavored E-Cigarette Products

Dear Mayor Peter Muldoon:

This correspondence is on behalf of the Community Prevention Coalition of Teton County (CPCTC) and is follow-up to previous letters requesting the town move forward with an ordinance that prohibits the sale of all flavored e-cigarette products in the town of Jackson. We are enthusiastic and appreciate the workshop you are holding to discuss this ordinance on April 20, 2020.

In the past three years there has been a noticeable increase in the use of Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS), among the youth in Teton County. Youth are initially attracted to e-cigarettes, vaporizers, and disposable electronic nicotine delivery devices in part because of the varietal sweet flavors including mint which of all the flavors provides a cool sensation and anesthetic feeling on the throat. Studies show that 66% of teens are not aware that these candy and mint flavored liquids contain nicotine and harmful chemical components. Nicotine is a highly addictive substance that can rewire the developing brain of youth and prime it for addiction. For most youth, vaping is the first nicotine product they will try. Evidence shows teens and young adults who vape are more likely to try illicit drugs and other tobacco products soon after their initial introduction to vaping.

In November of 2019, the Town Council of Pinedale, WY passed an ordinance banning the sale of flavored tobacco products in town limits. Further, four US states have now taken action to reverse the vaping epidemic that is addicting a new generation of kids, by banning all sales of e-cigarette flavored products. The Community Prevention Coalition of Teton County asks that Jackson please do the same. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Mayor Peter Muldoon:

I am writing on behalf of the Community Prevention Coalition of Teton County (CPCTC), Gillian Chapman, Superintendent of Schools for Teton County; James Howell, Assistant Principal of Jackson Hole Middle School; Dan Abraham, Assistant Principal at Jackson Hole High School and Pier Trudelle, Principal at Summit Innovations High School to address the issue of vaping and its impact on our community's youth. The intent of this letter is to propose a town ordinance to ban the sale of all flavored vape products in town limits.

In the past three years there has been a noticeable increase in the use of e-cigarettes among the teens in Teton County. Teens are initially attracted to e-cigarettes, or vape pens, in part because of the varietal sweet flavored vaping products. Studies show that 66% of teens are not aware that these candy flavored liquids contain nicotine. Nicotine is a highly addictive substance that can rewire the developing brain of teens and prime it for addiction. For most teens, vaping is the first nicotine product they will try. Evidence shows teens who vape are more likely to try illicit drugs and other tobacco products soon after their initial introduction to vaping.

In November of 2019, the Town Council of Pinedale passed an ordinance on the sale of flavored vaping products in town limits. Inspired by Pinedale's swift action to respond to the uptick of their school children experimenting with vaping, the Coalition asks that Jackson do the same. This writer, along with Trudy Funk of Curran Seeley Foundation; Beverly Shore, Community Prevention Specialist of the Health Department of Teton County, and the TCSD members mentioned above, ask for the opportunity to meet with you and the Town Council to converse about a ban on all flavored vape products within our town limits.
